Join us for the September 7 meeting and learn about a new quilting challenge presented by Jeanine Norrish that will be a really fun one. If you haven't participated in a challenge before, you will find it showcases many members creativity. You will have until March to complete your entry and prizes will be awarded based on votes for your favorites.

Also at the September meeting, I will announce another round of the UFO Challenge, which challenges us to finish some unfinished projects. It's a simple and effective way to motivate us to really finish those projects that are just waiting for us to complete. You are asked to make a list of 10 UFO's (or less if you have fewer to finish). You should number them and at each meeting we will draw a number and you work on that one on your list to finish by the next meeting. The members who bring a finished UFO from their list will be entered in a drawing. It sounds simple, but it really does help get through some of the quilts we have waiting for our attention. I must say, the Quilt Show highlighted a very talented group of quilters. I have heard only compliments from the community. And that is what we are all about, educating the community and this year we included the community with the Honor Quilts. So! How many of you are inspired and ready to sew again?

I am planning a workshop November 3 and 4 at the Humboldt Grange (our usual meeting place). Set up is arranged for 9:30 with classes starting at 10 going on until 3. Jeanine Norrish is presenting English paper piecing for projects "on the go." And Helen Saunders is presenting machine paper piecing. We will have kits for you, supply lists will be available after sign-ups. Of course, machine paper piecing, you need to bring your sewing machine. And everyone needs to bring their preferred snacks/ lunch. I am really hoping we have 20-25 sign up. I plan on dividing the class, so half will learn from Helen and half will learn from Jeanine, then the next day you trade places and learn from the other tutor. At the end of the workshop, you will have two new techniques! Now I know there are some of us leaning toward machine work because our fingers are tired. I am happy to have you in Helen's class both days. And for those of you who must work and can only make one day, you may choose which technique to learn on the day you can come. If the participants agree, Helen and I thought we could put all the machine paper pieced blocks together in a quilt to raffle off at the guild raffle table. Showing off our success is good advertising for future workshops.

It has become necessary to charge a little more for workshops to cover the costs of presenting them, so this workshop is \$25/day. I am aware of new members (YEAH) who might have a tough time paying for the workshop but have a strong desire to attend. I want you to know we have a few **scholarships** available so please contact me to make those arrangements. Anyone who wishes to help facilitate new young members please let me know you are willing to **sponsor** a seat at the workshop.

I will be represented by Nancy Frost at the September general meeting, unfortunately I will not be available except by email. Please sign up at the meeting, checks payable to REQG.

Now a side benefit to this workshop is I am leading the development of an opportunity quilt for guild year 2024-25 and it is PAPER PIECED! Come January (and future months) I plan on arranging sewing days (dates and location to be determined) so willing members can contribute to the making of the opportunity quilt. It is a beautiful autumn leaves made with Free Spirit fabrics and measures 85 x 110. This quilt requires accurate quarter inch seams and precision sewing but there will be steps everyone can do. I will need help! More information will be coming when my plans are confirmed. I will try to plan different days of the week in an effort to allow more people to attend.

We are making an effort to make opportunities for members to meet and work together and contribute to the guild. Please join us!

Quilt Show Wrap up!!

If you did not attend the 2023 quilt show, you missed a beautiful show. The Arcata Community Center was a great venue with plenty of parking and a large, clean bathroom that was easily accessible.

There were over 200+ quilts displayed in the large gym plus quilts in three other rooms. In addition to the main quilt display, the gym also had space for vendors. There were 12 different vendors with some appealing products (and credit cards were accepted by every vendor). Across from the entry to the gym, the Featured Quilters had their booth. Joyce Turner and Yvonne Jolley were greeted and spoke to most attendees during the two days of the show.

The attendance at the show was up from the two previous shows. There were over 700 tickets sold to seniors, 300 tickets sold to adults and 53 free tickets given to children and seniors 90+. The Timber Ridge Assisted Living facility brought a bus with 14 attendees. If we add in all the volunteers who worked at receiving, set-up, and during the show on Saturday and Sunday, we had well over 1,200 attendees.

New quilt show features included the Dutch Lottery. Connie Johnson pulled together 13 different basket items plus a sewing machine donated by Hokema Sewing Center from Redding. She did a brisk business selling tickets and people were eager to win all the baskets that were displayed.

Another new feature was the Bobbin Bistro, our in-house café, which was decorated in red/white/and blue and looked wonderful with the 13 honor quilts that were on display in the room. On Sunday, the Bistro was closed at 2 pm to set up for the Honor Quilt Program. The honorees and their family and friends who attended were very impressed with the ceremony and receiving a quilt. Helen Saunders was the Mistress of Ceremony and did a great job. The Bobbin Bistro run by Wanda Wahlund and Amy Gomes served sandwiches, soups, salad, cookies, and fruit. It was so relaxing to be served food and be able to sit, chat, and view the honor quilts.

On the odd numbered hours, vintage (50-year-old) and antique (100-year-old) quilts, better known among quilters as bed turning was masterfully presented by Janet Fessler and her helpers. On the even numbered hours Catherine Brown and Jeannie O'Neal arranged to have a few of our members and vendors give demonstrations.

Down the hall in the Arts and Craft room, Jeanine Norrish and her cadre of volunteers helped attendees compile their 9 patch squares and sew them together so that the squares could be placed on the display walls. Jeanine now has 257 completed squares, and 72 squares that still need to be sewn. Those squares will be made into lap and bed size quilts that will be donated to the community.

Our last display at the quilt show featured photo replicas of the quilted wedges in the Christmas Tree skirt for Sugar Bear, the Douglas Fir tree, which went to Washington D.C. December 2021. Maggie Stimson was responsible for this display. Attendees slowly viewed the photos and read the descriptions as they made their way down the hall. Most attendees then viewed the display set up outside by staff from Six Rivers National Forest office and had their picture taken with Smokey Bear

There were numerous committee chairs who worked behind the scenes – before, during, and after the show that need to be recognized besides those mentioned above. Those individuals are Susie Freese, Gail Owren, Tina Fulton, Debbie Marshall, LeeAnn Moore, Carol Hanson, Lynne Todoroff, Pat Smith, Carolyn Pounds, Yvonne Jolley, Angie Tustison, Bettyann Biringer Rehm, Pam Smith, Kathy LaForge, Terry Tauzer, and Martha Johnson. In addition to the above individuals there were so many members from the three guilds, plus friends and family of guild members who volunteered during the show that need to be thanked. It takes a small village to put on a successful quilt show.

The quilt show is a key fund raiser for the guild. The 2023 quilt show cleared \$8,000 after expenses. The funds will help pay for the guild's insurance, storage rental fees, hall rental, etc. Besides raising funds, the quilt show is our prime vehicle for educating the public about quilts making, quilt history and our local quilt masters. The 2023 quilt show was a success, and the success will be repeated during the 2025 quilt show.

New Guild Liaison to the Blood Bank is Needed

Every four to six months the display of smaller quilts in the donor room of the Northern California Community Blood Bank is changed. The quilts come from the private collections of REQG members. The quilts are solicited and gathered by the guild's liaison (Currently that person is Nancy Frost), she delivers them to the blood bank which is located near Providence Hospital. The staff at the blood bank climb the ladder, remove the outgoing quilts, and hang new quilts in their place. Members who wish to sell their quilts can set their own price and interested donors/staff can arrange to purchase the quilts when the display is taken down.

The liaison position truly consumes little time. S/he solicits and collects the smaller quilts from members or friends, types up the list of quilts that are to be in the display and the owners' names, as well as a name card with price if the quilt is for sale, and at the end of the display returns quilts to their rightful owners. A request for quilts can be made orally at guild meetings and/or in the monthly newsletter. It takes approximately 22 quilts that are no larger than 40 inches in width to adequately fill the wall space in the donor room. This is an easy committee, but it is more fun to do if you have a pal to do it with.

The current quilt display will remain at the blood bank until the end of September. A new exhibit should be ready to go on the first of October. For more information about the position talk to Nancy Frost. Volunteers should contact President Maggie Stimson.

2024 Challenge Quilt

Here is the grand reveal for the 2024 Challenge quilt...

*Where you live.

Your interpretation, could be your house, neighborhood, county,

country, bathroom, bed, you get the idea.

*Must have a heart.

Any way you want, applique, iron-on, quilted, part of the fabric.

*Must have the color 🤍 green

*Can be any size, but keep in mind it will show better if it's wall hanging size.

I came up with this idea because I always wanted an excuse to do a quilted

version of my house, now I'll have to.










Block of Month REQG - Due at October Meeting This month is a little different in that there are three "blocks" and they can be assembled into the quilt shown below. The blocks finish at 6" x 6 "and the quilt finishes at 51" x 63" if the 1½" inner border and the 3" outer border are used.




Block A is cut as a 6½" x 6½" square. Please use a dark blue that reads as a "solid". It can be a plain, mottled, tone-ontone, batik or small print fabric.

Block B is a red and tan stripe. It is finishes at 6" x 6" and is 6½" x 6½" before sewn into quilt. It has two 2" tan strips and one 2" red strip. Again use fabrics that read as "solid".



Block C is a 4-patch with 3" squares. It finishes at 6"x 6" and is 6½" x 6½" before sewn into quilt. Use lots of different colors but each 4-patch should have two dark and two light or medium-light squares. Again use fabrics that read as "solid".

To make the number of blocks for the quilt shown at right, make sets of A, B and C. For each set, make one Block A, two Block Bs and one block C.




Block A. Simply cut a 61/2" x 61/2" square.

If you want to make lots of sets, note that you can get 6 Block As from a WOF Strip. If you are using fat quarters, you can cut 3 Block As from the 21" edge of the fat quarter. You need 15 A Blocks for the quilt shown.

Block B. Make two blocks. From the tan fabric, cut four pieces that are $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $6\frac{1}{2}$ " and from the red fabric, cut two pieces that are $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $6\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Sew a tan strip to each side of each red strip. Press toward the red strips. Simple rotate one of the blocks 90 degrees to get the vertically oriented block B.


If you want to make lots of sets, Cut two 2½" x WOF tan strips and one 2½" x WOF red strip. Sew together with red fabric in the center. Press toward red and then cross cut into six 6½" B blocks. If you are using fat quarters, sew two tan 21" strips to the outside of the red strip. Press toward red strip and cross cut 6½" blocks. You can cut 3 Block Bs from the 21" edge. The quilt shown needs 32 B blocks. **Block C.** Cut four pieces of fabric, each $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x $3\frac{1}{2}$ ". Use as as many colors as you like but use two dark and two light or medium-light fabrics in each block. Sew squares together in pairs using one dark and one light or medium-light per pair. Press toward darker square. Nesting seams, sew the two pairs together with the dark fabrics in opposite corners. Press in any direction you want.



You would need 16 four-patches to make the quilt pictured. Inner border is 1½", cut 5 strips 2" x WOF Outer Border is 3", Cut 5 strips 3½" x WOF

If 16 sets of blocks are contributed, the winner can make this quilt without additonal blocks.






